



Wellbeing Matters!

Well, we find ourselves at that time of year again. Heading into autumn ... the end of school holidays and the start of a new school year. In the health and wellness industry this is often viewed as a second New Year but what does that actually mean? Well Christmas is coming I suppose!

We seem to live in a social media-fuelled dependence on a dopamine-rich, instant reward hunt: the quick fix: the easy win. Ironically, this also taps into a basic human tendency to take the path of least resistance - a deep-seated

evolutionary pattern of animal behaviour! This can make us tunnel-visioned, whether focusing on diet, exercise or just fitting into the new jeans,

the little black dress or party outfit! If we don't get a win now, we lose motivation, we lose the will to carry on, and who really cares if we eat well or bother to exercise?

Sometimes we need to lift our head and zoom out. We need to be prepared to commit for longer, to look at the bigger picture, and this can be where engaging the help of somebody else comes in, be that clubs, talk therapy groups or working with clinics like us and our social media support group. The camaraderie and sense of belonging to something 'bigger than you' helps us feel someone else cares whether you stav on track or not.

Working as a Wellbeing Coach, whether in the nutrition practice or the mental/emotional wellbeing clinic, with individuals, families or organisations within their work culture, accountability (helping you to achieve what you want to achieve beyond the point where you stopped if you were doing it by yourself) is often the key to success, but so is patience!

When I think back to some of the biggest changes I've made with my own health, the success came in the endeavour - the long game. If I wanted a guick win, I became so head-down focused on the minutiae of what was going on right in front of me, I actually became unhealthily obsessed! I couldn't be flexible. I worried

all the time, put unreasonable pressure on myself and if I didn't get instant results, had "failed...again".





The key to making long-term changes with our health comes from patience, consistence, accountability and support somebody helping to champion us through the darker days. Zooming out and focusing on a longer-term goal is much more realistic for lifelong change, but it pushes against our desire for instant gratification.

It is important to have signposts along the way, keeping us on track, which is one of the key things we do with our clients in the wellness space. But it's also important to keep the bigger picture in mind, to release the obsessive focus. We maximise our flexibility, develop more self-compassion and patience but don't let ourselves off making consistent effort. Leaning into support if motivation is waning really helps.



help and advice on the use of PCs, laptops and tablets. The group meets on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings from 9.30 to 11.30am and new members are always welcome to join on whichever day they prefer.

Although younger people have grown up with computers, many older people have had limited experience of them in either their working or personal life. FCCG aims to help people to improve their knowledge, confidence and understanding, either through structured exercises which they can work through at their own pace or by answering specific questions which are raised. Because of the informal nature of the group people can also learn from each other as they try different things.

The group would also welcome new volunteers who have some experience of using computers or tablets. You don't need to be an IT expert, as a basic knowledge, an enquiring mind, and a willingness to share, are sufficient to deal with most issues. For more complex questions, experienced people are at hand to offer support to other volunteers.

Disability Charity, Paul's Place, has unveiled plans for a move to

'The Shire Way Centre' in what is a "really transformative and exciting time" for the charity and the local community.

The charity enhances the lives of physically disabled adults, and currently operates out of Coalpit Heath cricket club, providing social activities that connect people, reduce isolation. improve health and wellbeing, and give people the opportunity to develop new skills and enjoy new experiences.

The much-loved Shire Way Community Centre. in Yate, has sat untouched since 2022 but Paul's Place is going to bring it back to life. The centre will provide space to support our members (service users) with a hub running daily activities and open up numerous opportunities to the local community. with plans for a community café, and an allotment where our members will grow produce for the café, are just some of our plans. We are also hoping to be able to provide space for the public to hire for activities and events.

Chief executive officer of Paul's Place, Lynda Williams said, "For the last 16 years, our current home has been the Coalpit Heath cricket club and it has been amazing for the charity, but with growth and increasing demand for our services, we have simply outgrown the building.

We are extremely excited about our move to Shire Way and the opportunities it will create for not only the charity but for local residents too.

Our charity's vision is for a 'Paul's Place Hub'. A completely accessible building that will allow us to support more disabled people, in turn reducing isolation, increasing opportunities for physically disabled adults to enter employment, become a visible part of the community and live their life to the full.



Alongside our daily activity facility, one of our plans is to set up a community café, which will be run by the adults we support. Shire Way will mean we are able to increase the number of activities and programmes we offer, as well as the number of members who are able to attend. We really hope the local community will get behind our plans and support us as much as possible.

There is a lot of work to do at the site before we can become operational and we anticipate our renovations will be carried out over the next 12 months, with a view to move our services once complete"

For more than 30 years, The Children's Hospice South West (CHSW) has been dedicated to helping local families make the most of short and precious lives.

The charity has three hospices across the south west, supporting more than 500 families; Charlton Farm near Bristol supports more than 200 local children and young people with life-limiting conditions and their families with a range of free services, all available 24 hours-a-day, 365 days-

Support for the whole family includes short breaks; specialist medical, palliative, emergency and end-of-life care; play and music therapy; activities for siblings; and bereavement support. During the Covid pandemic, the charity adapted its care model to extend support to families' own homes.

When Noa died at Charlton Farm in November 2018, aged three months old, the care, compassion and support the family received from the hospice helped give them the time and space they needed to say goodbye. Here mum, Jo explains why the family will be forever grateful to Charlton Farm for the vital help and support during Noa's life and after she had died.

"Me and my husband, Jim and our daughters Nellie, aged 3 and Ada aged 1 love coming together to visit Charlton Farm and reflect on the memories that we had with Noa. One thing that we love about the support at Charlton Farm is that, despite our girls not being born when Noa was here, members of staff have built lovely relationships with them to help them process and understand grief, having lost their sister they never met. It's incredible how they intentionally want to help support your grief for a long time after, even though our time there was so brief. We visit Charlton Farm every year on Noa's anniversary which is really special for us. It's really great getting to take them somewhere specific where they get attention and we get to mark Noa's anniversary and somewhere she actually



was. Our favourite place is the trees in the garden where we take photos, because that was the first place Noa was properly outside in her life."

CHSW needs around £11m a year to run its three children's hospices, and around 85 per cent is raised through voluntary donations. Their promise is to 'make the most of short and precious lives across the South West. Minister's Message - Focus on the positive

We need recognise the

and to be thankful for it.

I write this at the end of the first week in September. The youngest has just started secondary school, and the next youngest has had an extra week at home due to illness - some of the household have had Covid. It has seemed a real struggle through the end of the summer to get to this point. Yet I know I am one of the lucky ones. My worries and stresses are limited compared to many others. I try to be thankful, but sometimes our thankfulness can be overshadowed by the things we perceive as challenging or by a stream of bad news.

The railways, the post office, the nurses, the doctors, the teachers have all been on strike. We are in the midst of a financial crisis, inflation continues to soar, but wages do not keep pace. Our NHS looks on the brink of collapse and our schools are falling down around our kids. Have I missed anvthing?

It is easy to watch the news or read the paper and be bombarded with the weight of all that is wrong with the world. Humanity seems to lurch from one crisis to the next.

I was talking to somebody this week who saw the 60s as the most hope-filled period in her life. A time when the war had finished, the country was recovering, and the population had freedoms it had not experienced before. Fantastic,

the best time to have lived was 20 odd years before I was even born. Surely nobody can have lived without any hope since then?

So where did this trouble start? It is difficult to pin-point an exact moment or an actual cause. I think it is likely to be associated with the change in attitude towards resourcefulness and value. When convenience became more important than quality. Perhaps this was started during that supposed golden era. Freedom was key to the hope, people were freer than they had been before, rationing was an issue for the generation before and the young had no direct experience of war. Technological solutions to problems were possible and necessary to deal with the boom in population and that was going to be the answer to everything, the new Jerusalem. This was the start of the build for today. with little thought for tomorrow.

Hvwel, my co-presenter on the 'Those Vicar Blokes' podcast says, "We can't be both safe and free". It certainly looks like the freedoms of the past are

> cheap or trendy but not to last, economical model seems to be a factor. It was surely and continues to be exacerbated ever since.

> How do we make it right? Jesus calls us to turn the world upside down. If we are going to achieve that we are going to have to change our attitude. We need to

recognise the good we have in our lives, to focus on the positive in our own life and to be thankful for it. Each day before you go to bed, think of 5 things you are thankful for and thank God for them, then think of just one thing that is not right, then thank God that he will show you how to make it better. God calls us to be creative, to be resourceful and to be considerate and not wasteful.

My prayer is that we can restore some hope to society, that we can regain the joy of our freedom. To use our freedom to do a better job of looking after each-other and the wider world, not for ourselves but for all who are and are to come.

Meet your PCC – Mark Shelford

Avon & Somerset Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC). Mark Shelford was elected as Conservative PCC in 2021.

This month I would like to take the opportunity to highlight the partnership between Avon and Somerset Police and defibrillator provider HeartSafe. Together, the partnership has funded over 130 bleed kits to be installed on the side of existing defibrillator cabinets across the county.

Emergency bleed kits are specifically designed to handle 'catastrophic bleeding'. They include items like dressings and a tourniquet allowing bystanders and/ or the injured person to provide immediate aid whilst waiting for an ambulance service to arrive at the scene.

Extra minutes can save lives. Visit HeartSafe's website to find out where bleed kits are located in your community.

Saturday 9th September marked Emergency Services Day. Also known as 999 Day, it promotes the work of the emergency services and emphasises the responsible public use of emergency services.

I want to say a big thank you to all the staff and volunteers who work tirelessly for keeping us safe and making a difference in our communities.

To mark the occasion, I attended a flag raising at City Hall in Bristol hosted by the Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor Paula O'Rourke.



Councillors regularly speak to local residents and hear first-hand their thoughts about policing and crime in their area. Since being PCC, it has been of utmost importance to work with councillors to ensure we are delivering effective and efficient policing across

I will be hosting a forum for South Gloucestershire councillors later this month and Bristol councillors in November.

On Monday 11th September I attended an anti-social behaviour (ASB) conference with hundreds of partners and the police all working together to deal with ASB.

It was great to see such involvement from all agencies, working alongside each other to tackle ASB in Bristol and the surrounding areas.

One of the topics discussed was the use of the StreetSafe tool. It is a free tool where members of the public can pinpoint on a map the location where they feel unsafe. The information provided will be considered alongside the extensive evidence base already gathered by police forces and used to inform the police and partner agencies such as local authorities.

No crime needs to have been committed in order to indicate where local people feel unsafe.

I would like to thank those for reporting crime, particularly burglaries, which have taken place recently in the area. The police rely on information from the public to build a picture of intelligence.

There are a number of ways you can report crimes. You can fill out a form, report it online or call 101 in a non-emergency.

Update from Jack Lopresti, MP

This past month, I had the pleasure of making many visits in the local area, one of which included the Patchway Men's Shed. Here we discussed how they help the local community including schools and community groups, as well as their future plans for the development of their site and how I could help by connecting them with businesses and organisations who could help.

I also had a great visit to the Bristol Academy of the Military Preparation College for Training where I met some inspiring learners hoping to become armed forces recruits and had a good discussion with them hearing how they are supported as young people to join the military.

Additionally, due to many issues raised by constituents. I held a meeting with our Police and Crime Commissioner Mark Shelford and Councillors Neel Das Gupta and Keith Cranney to discuss anti-social behaviour, e-scooters. and the Meade Park fire. We also discussed neighbourhood policing and how the council can do more to tackle graffiti.

In addition, I had the opportunity to attend some great community events this month including the South Gloucestershire Show where I met with Jackie & Anna from the Staple Hill branch of the Royal British Legion and got to see some of the products of our agricultural industry in South Gloucestershire. I also visited the 60th Winterbourne Down and District Horticultural Society 60th Annual Show which had some fantastic displays.

I have also recently been on another visit to Ukraine. This time I met with a number of influential organisations and officials in Ukraine's defence industry and in government. This included productive meetings with Herman Smetanin, Head of Ukroboronprom; Sergii Boyev, Deputy Minister for Strategic Industries responsible for European Integration; Alexander Kamyshin, Minister for Strategic Industries of Ukraine; and Oleksandr Zavitnevych, Chair of the Parliamentary Committee on National Security, Defence and Intelligence. We discussed closer collaboration between British and Ukrainian defence companies to support



the war effort. I also had the opportunity to discuss defence procurement cooperation with the Ukrainian Defence Minister Oleksii Reznikov, and the continuing support our nation will provide for Ukraine on their path to victory.

On this visit I was also able to go to the Ukrainian frontline (photo below) and was honoured be able to speak to some of the troops and see such high morale among soldiers. Many of them were trained in the UK and it was great to see British kit and equipment in action such as the AS-90 self-propelled artillery from my son's army unit.



Back in the UK, I also had the opportunity to show my support for Ukraine on National Flag Day and Ukrainian Independence Day on which my office hung the Ukrainian flag in solidarity with the gallant Ukrainian people. I also went to a BBQ at the Ukrainian Refugee Hub at St. Andrew's Church in Avonmouth organised by the Bristol Rapid Relief Team who did a fantastic job delivering a great event for the Ukrainian refugees in our area.




