Willow Brook Tenant Talks:

Ben Matthews, WB Operations Manager chats with this edition's selected tenant Alan Harmer. Manager of the Giant Cycle Shop

At Willow Brook are proud to home many prestigious tenants and one of them is certainly the "Giant" cycle store.

As with most successful businesses, they are only as good as those who operate within, and in this case, store manager Alan Harmer and his resolute team.

Alan has been managing the Giant Bristol store since it opened its doors in August 2009 and is one of a few tenants that have traded at Willow Brook since the early years. Very few have intricately witnessed Willow Brook's journey from conception to present. Alan is one of those people.

A stalwart Manager for Giant, Alan's presence during my tenure over the last 8 years has earned him the reputation of being a constant. Highs and lows, Alan has witnessed it all at Willow Brook, if the walls could talk, I can only imagine they would have Alan's voice.

I first met Alan in March 2017, he was very established within his role at that point as I was just beginning my Willow Brook journey. What struck me first was the store - organised, clean, and staff greeting you upon entry - it was evident that the unit was well managed. Over the years I have got to know Alan his passion and care for leading really stood out for me.

At the start of February, I sat down with Alan and discussed all things Giant and Willow Brook. He told me about the ventures that led to him



managing the store. With no experience within the cycle industry, Alan's background WILLOW BROOK was retail management, more specifically furniture. Alan was approached by Giant for his retail management expertise and jumped at an exciting new opportunity. Alan said, "It was a challenging initially with no prior extensive knowledge of bikes but that ultimately, when you put the differences aside it was my people management skills that eased the transition."

A skillset for which I can youch.

When asked about the challenges the store faces in today's retail climate, Alan proudly told me that "Giant are competitive, with a range of cycles to suit all needs. The real challenge is competing with the online businesses who can operate with next to no overheads."

Another challenge faced is that the store is located on the lower footfall side of the centre, we spoke on how the centre has been collaborating with Giant and our other tenants to entice customers their way. Through initiatives

that have helped increase dwell time, we have helped raise the awareness for customers who otherwise may not have ventured Giant's way. I asked about the main source of income for the shop. To my surprise, the workshop which conducts services and maintenance tends to be the far busier of the two services. Alan informed me that around 50% of the bikes they work on are not Giant or Liv branded, the exception being electric bikes where they only maintain Giant for software reasons.

Regarding electric bikes, I asked about the demand for them in the area. I was aware that Giant were front runners in their use and application of them, so I was keen to hear Alan's views. He informed me that they were first introduced to the shop as early as 2010. at which point they accounted for 6 - 8% of their total business. Present day it accounts for approximately 35-40%, and purchased for a variety of reasons. More customers are purchasing them for the 'fun factor'. We then spoke about the uses of Giant bikes in general. I asked if bikes were primarily purchased for domestic use, Alan told me that I would be surprised how many are used for racing, trails, and downhill courses. I asked Alan if he had dabbled in any of these purposes to which he laughed and said no. As I already knew, Alan is an avid golf fan and to be fair there are probably a few things to try between the two.

We then spoke about Willow Brook in general and the changes he would have seen over the years. We agree that the additions to the centre over the last couple of years have been instrumental in attracting new customers to the centre. With more asset, marketing and

operational initiatives on the horizon. Alan was keen to see what is in store for Willow Brook over the next year or two.

As the conversation wound down, I asked Alan a series of quick-fire questions.

What do you do to relax? I took up Golf around 10 years ago. Prior to that I always enjoyed squash and cricket.

What is your favorite book or movie? Jimmy Greaves autobiography, film would be the Jungle book. I associate it with watching with my daughter. Another would be Escape to victory.

Favorite holiday destination? I have always visited Lanzarote and Spain, more recently I have had trips to Australia to visit friends.

First job? Woolworths as a trainee manager. They would not let me have Saturdays off to play football, so it did not work out.

Who inspires you? My Wife (this is the only right answer for the record!).

It has been suggested that the WI recognise VE Day on May 8th, using bunting and clothes to reflect the 1940s

After the raffle, Carol Shields introduced our speaker, David Hardill, Community Heritage Officer at Yate District Heritage Centre. He was able to tell us about the Berkeley and Poyntz families who were the two major landowners during Tudor times.

Yate dates back to the 8th century and during the Tudor period, the landscape was of enclosures, commons for grazing, deer parks and large fields. Cloth and wool contributed to the economy.

Within the Yate area, the Berkeley family owned Yate Court and were known for their great feasts. Dishes included game, venison, lamb and larks tongues! The Poyntz family owned Acton Court. Religion played a major part in the influence that both families had at Court. As the English Reformation brought changes from Catholicism to Protestantism, the Monarchs reflected these changes. The Berkeley family were Catholic and enjoyed more prominence during Mary's reign. whereas the Povntz family were Protestant and their influence grew during the reigns of Edward 6th and Elizabeth 1st. Nicholas Poyntz the Elder, a friend of Thomas Cromwell, acquired Kingswood Abbey during the Dissolution of the Monasteries and was made High Sheriff of Gloucestershire.

Carol Shields thanked David for an interesting talk which highlighted the development of Yate and the surrounding area during the Tudor period. It's historical importance is still evident today at both Acton Court and Horton Court.

Zeniah's Family Story

Zeniah was born in 2019 with serious health challenges. After an emergency C-section, she spent two weeks in the NICU and was diagnosed with a heart murmur. At 4 weeks old, she underwent an 8-hour surgery for a severe heart condition, with only a 50/50 chance of survival.

Though she recovered, more surgery was needed due to fluid in her heart. Later, Zeniah was diagnosed with Mowat-Wilson Syndrome, a rare genetic condition, and epilepsy.

Zeniah is described as a happy, social child with a strong sense of empathy. She loves interacting with others and is known for giving hugs and blowing kisses. Her family, living in Bristol, continued caring for her at home, but without sufficient support, they began to struggle.

After a referral, the family first visited Children's Hospice South West (CHSW)'s Charlton Farm in Wraxall; Dana, Zeniah's mother, said it was as if they had been "scooped up and looked after".

Charlton Farm provided essential respite care, offering the family time to rest and recharge. The staff understood their struggles and helped organise a care package, offering support for the entire family. Kirianna. Zeniah's 11-vear-old sister, has also become an active fundraiser for CHSW, organising cake sales, a neighbourhood Easter trail, and a charity netball tournament at her school. She finds comfort in meeting other siblings of

children with similar health challenges, creating a shared understanding.

Dana reflects on how the support from CHSW has transformed their lives: "It's been transformational. We feel we have someone in our corner at all times."

The care and support at Charlton Farm have given the family the ability to breathe again and manage their challenges more easily. "Charlton Farm has been a real turning point for us." Dana says.

Family Wins Battle to Secure the Right School for their Son

UK parents recently received their local authority's decision on school placements. While many are satisfied, some families now face the difficult decision of whether to challenge their child's allocation. One family's experience highlights how expert legal support can help secure the right educational setting for a child with special needs.

Their son, who has autism, was placed in a maintained special secondary school. However, his parents knew this wasn't the right fit, as he had previously struggled in a larger primary setting. His EHCP required crucial Speech and Language Therapy, which he wasn't receiving. Despite their concerns, the local authority insisted their chosen school could meet his needs, citing a £70,000 annual cost difference with the parents' preferred specialist ASD School.

With the help of specialist Education Lawyers here at HCB Solicitors, the family challenged the decision at the First-tier Tribunal. Independent reports confirmed the child needed a setting with class sizes no larger than five or six, on-site therapy, and a peer group with similar needs. Further investigation uncovered critical shortcomings in the local authority's school, leading them to concede before the hearing.

Three months after lodging the appeal, the family secured a placement at a small independent special school. The difference has been life-changing. Their son now has a one-to-one support worker, tailored teaching, and access to therapy. His progress has been remarkable—advancing in phonics and maths, thriving in a smaller classroom, and growing in confidence.

The family is overjoyed, describing the school's support as exceptional. They urge other parents facing similar battles to seek expert legal guidance, as specialist support can make all the difference in securing the right educational placement.

Handmade Gonks for Charity Appeal

After a long wait, Paul's Place, a local charity for physically disabled adults is finally moving from where it rents at Coalpit Heath Cricket Club. The charity will move into its very own premises where it can support more physically disabled people with improved facilities and a wider range of services and activities. They will enjoy the opportunities that the rest of us often take for granted. The former Shire Way Community Centre will become Paul's Place Hub. This is a massive undertaking only made possible with legacy donations and successful grant applications. But Paul's Place needs your support to get them through the door by this summer 2025.

Last summer, thieves stole lead from our roof at Shire Way, the only part of the building that didn't need any work. Paul's Place member (service user), Georghie, tirelessly made and sold handmade Gonks to support the cost of repairing the roof. So far she has made over one hundred Gonks, selling each Gonk for £2, raising an impressive £335 towards her £500 target. It's a delicate craft where Georghie can only use her one hand to thread wool to create a small and woolly gnome figure. A huge achievement, despite having a physical disability, which affects her hearing, sight, legs and arms.

It all started during the Covid lockdown years. Support worker, Maria introduced making Gonks at Paul's Place. Since then Georghie has continued making Gonks for members and staff at Paul's Place, for carers, family members and friends of friends. They cheered up those who became unwell during our cold and dark winter months. And care workers requested Georghie's handmade Gonks after showing their other clients.

The Gonks covered every occasion, from Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day to Valentine's Day. She even made twenty-five Gonks for a junior football team in their blue and yellow colours.





If Georghie doesn't have a particular colour, she will wait until her next bulk buy of wool to keep the cost down. Georghie says, "My favourite Gonks were the Christmas Gonks, because they had glitter, and the first eight I made, as they came out fluffier than I expected. I get asked, 'how do I make them with one hand? I reply, you find a way'. I love making Gonks. The end product is so satisfying and it's a project I can do myself."

After Georghie hits her £500 target for Paul's Place, she'll continue making Gonks to raise money for Cancer Research. For Disability Pride, which takes place in July every year, Georghie plans on making Gonks with multicolour hair, so watch this space.

I recently welcomed the latest report by His Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary and Fire & Rescue Services into the effectiveness and efficiency of Avon and Somerset Police, published in February.

One of my main responsibilities as your Police and Crime Commissioner is the scrutiny and governance of the police service, which means monitoring and challenging the Chief Constable to ensure that Avon and Somerset Police is delivering an effective and efficient service to you and our communities.

The Police Efficiency Effectiveness and Legitimacy Inspection, or PEEL as it is known, provides important additional evidence to support me in my scrutiny role and guide the focus of that scrutiny alongside the main oversight delivered through my Police and Crime Plan.



I'm pleased that the report noted that Avon and Somerset Police were found to be Good in two areas: preventing crime and police powers and public treatment.

However, the report highlighted that Avon and Somerset Police is only Adequate at developing a positive workplace and that their service Requires Improvement in five areas: responding to the public; investigating crime; protecting vulnerable people; managing offenders and leadership and force management. These are all key areas I have already identified for Avon and Somerset to focus on, and they are also within the five priorities of my Police and Crime Plan, which gives me confidence that my plan is focusing on the right things to deliver a more effective and efficient service for you.

I will continue to monitor closely the progress Avon and Somerset Police is making against all the Areas For Improvement (AFIs) within this report, paying particular attention to the observation regarding the same

areas that still require improvement since the last

HMICFRS PEEL inspection.




